






USING URINE DIPSTICKS TO DIAGNOSE A UTI

TO DIP OR NOT TO DIP







CATHETERISED PATIENTS

Catheter urine will often have bacteria present on culture and urine dip will be positive - this does not indicate an infection.



Positive urine dip and culture is not uncommon in older people and does not indicate a UTI in the absence of symptoms.

MEN

Where symptoms and signs suggest a urine infection send a urine culture.







URINE CULTURE

In hospital send a urine culture if treating a UTI, including for: Patients admitted with UTI and sepsis, persistent symptoms, recurrent UTI, unexplained fever, previous resistant UTI, care home residents.

WOMEN UNDER 65

Diagnose a UTI based on two or more symptoms:
new dysuria, nocturia, frequency, urgency, or haematuria.
Positive nitrite on urine dipstick supports the diagnosis.

DELIRIUM

Delirium requires a holistic assessment. The frail elderly may not display the usual symptoms and signs of UTI.

Do not use urine dipstick.
