Paul's story – life with Cystic Fibrosis

Paul was born in 1953, at a time when little was known about Cystic Fibrosis. His older brother had died in 1952 and his mother, Betty, noticed Paul exhibited similar symptoms. Determined to help her son survive, she wrote to doctors in Harley Street, America, and Australia. However, they offered no medical advice—only sympathy and prayers.

In the early 1960s, Betty worked tirelessly to raise awareness about the condition and was a cornerstone for creating support for people living with Cystic Fibrosis.

Despite the challenges, Paul was doing well and growing into a mischievous little boy. As a teenager, he had to visit children's hospitals to see doctors since there were no clinics for adults with the condition at the time. Paul saw many of his friends lose their battle with Cystic Fibrosis, which left him feeling isolated.

In the mid-1970s, Dr Brian Stack opened an adult clinic for those with Cystic Fibrosis, and his exceptional care greatly benefited Paul. Undergoing two bowel surgeries in his 20s due to blockages, Paul experienced ongoing issues that persisted into his late 50s. In the mid-2000s, lung problems worsened, requiring IV treatments, hospital stays, and recovery at home.


People who meet Paul are often amazed by his positive outlook on life and his tremendous sense of humour, which has occasionally landed him in trouble! Paul's wife, Anne Marie, like his mother, has been a strong source of support throughout their marriage.

Despite his health challenges Paul worked for the Glasgow City Council Housing Department for 32 years. He has a great love for cars, music, and football. He attended his first gig in the 70s and continues to enjoy live music today.
