




Prof. Brian Williams is Professor of Behavioural Science and Health Services Research. He is currently Deputy Principal at the University of the Highlands and Islands. He has worked at multiple Scottish universities in a range of research leadership capacities. He was Director of the Social Dimensions of Health Institute (Dundee & St Andrews), and former Director of the Chief Scientist Office NMAHP Research Unit. He has been cross-disciplinary Dean for Research Enhancement (Stirling) and lead for Research Leadership and Structures (Edinburgh Napier). He has spent much of his career in research capacity and capability building roles within the NMAHP community. He has sat on multiple research committees and until recently was chair of the CSO's studentship funding panel and postdoctoral funding panel. He has published over 150 research papers and been awarded over 80 research grants.



Dr. Jenna Breckenridge is a clinical academic, holding a joint appointment as Senior Lecturer in Health Sciences at the University of Dundee and the Lead for Allied Health Professions Research in NHS Tayside. She is an Occupational Therapist by background and her career spans nearly 20 years of working in health and social science research. Her expertise is in qualitative research, knowledge mobilisation, and research capacity and culture building.



Prof. Kay Cooper is Clinical Professor of Allied Health Professions, a joint appointment between Robert Gordon University and NHS Grampian, and Associate Dean (Research) in the School of Health. Kay is also Director of the JBI Scottish Centre for Evidence-based Practice, which focuses on conducting and training others to conduct high-quality evidence syntheses. Kay's research focuses on self-management of long-term conditions, and interventions to facilitate self-management and promote physical and mental wellbeing. Kay also has an interest in health service delivery research and a passion for supporting practicing Allied Health Professionals to get into research and to use research findings within their practice.



Dr. Gearóid Brennan is the Lead Psychiatric Liaison Nurse at the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh where he leads a small team of clinical nurse specialists, providing specialist mental health input to clinical toxicology, the emergency department and acute medicine. He is an NRS Career Researcher Fellow which allows him to continue developing his research career by undertaking projects related to the intersection between mental health and emergency care. He is co-chair of the Acute Response to emergency Mental Health and Substance use (ARMHS) Research Network. He is an Associate Editor with *Evidence Based Nursing*.
