### International Women's Day March 8th

This International Women's Day, we're taking a closer look at the unique challenges women face when it comes to heart health. Heart disease remains the leading cause of death among women, yet women are often not seen as being at risk of heart attacks, leading to a gap in awareness and timely diagnosis. 2022 **British** According to the Heart Foundation (BHF) Bias and Biology Report, women are more likely to be misdiagnosed or diagnosed much later than men, which can result in slower access to appropriate care.

Women are less likely to receive optimal treatment for heart conditions, and they often experience significant barriers to accessing cardiac rehabilitation services. These issues are compounded by the lack of inclusion of women in cardiovascular research, where much of the science has historically focused on male biology and risk factors, leaving a major gap in our understanding of heart disease in women.

At Heart Manual, we are committed to improving awareness, care, and research in women's heart health.

### Adapting the DK:REACH-HF Study to the Danish Context

As part of our ongoing work with REACH facilitator training, we'd like to highlight the DK:REACH-HF study, which is focused on adapting the REACH-HF programme for individuals with heart failure and their caregivers in Denmark (Eghoj et al., 2024). The programme, which is evidence-based and home-based, is being tailored to the specific needs of the Danish healthcare system and cultural context. The goal is to ensure that the programme is accessible, effective, and beneficial for patients and their families, providing support directly in their homes. The study also emphasizes the important role of caregivers in the rehabilitation process, aiming for better long-term outcomes for heart failure patients. This adaptation is a great example of how the REACH-HF programme can be customized to meet the needs of different populations, and we are proud to be part of its training and implementation here.
