Research Roundup

Listening and learning: Management of COVID-19 by care home staff

Dr Jenni Burton from the University of Glasgow wants to speak to anyone who has worked in care homes in Scotland at any point during the COVID-19 pandemic (March 2020 to February 2022) about their experiences of managing COVID-19. A review of a digital tech programme tackling social isolation in care homes

Working in collaboration with the Scottish Government's Technology Enabled Care (TEC) Programme and the Digital Health & Care Innovation Centre (DHI), a team of academics from the University of Stirling have been funded to study the success of a pioneering digital inclusion programme rolled out in care homes during the pandemic. The project will evaluate the 'Connecting Residents in Scotland's Care Homes' (CRSCH) initiative, which was launched in November 2020 with the aim of equipping all care homes in Scotland with iPads. The team would like to speak to care home staff who were working as 'Digital Champions' within care homes that engaged with the programme. <u>Understanding the barriers and facilitators to research involvement</u>

Researchers from NHS Tayside are looking for staff from Scottish Care Homes for older people and/or people living with dementia or neuroprogressive conditions. They would like staff to complete a 10-minute survey about past and present research involvement of their care home, as well as consider possible facilitators and barriers to research. Exploring and Understanding the lived experience in Care homes for older people of Infection risk and transmission during the COVID-19 pandemic

This study is exploring how care home residents, staff and families and friends of residents experienced coping with preventing spread and transmission of the SARS-CoV-2 virus to inform development of guidelines and support in managing future outbreaks of infectious diseases and in providing support to those living and working in care homes. Recruitment is to a survey and individual interviews. Interview participants will be offered a £10 voucher; 20 survey respondents will be drawn at random to win a £10 gift voucher when the survey closes. The researchers are keen to draw from a variety of perspectives and would like to recruit domestic, administrative, catering and grounds members of staff.

<u>Approach to acute functional decline in care homes: A qualitative interview study with care home staff</u>


A team of researchers led by the University of Oxford want care home staff to participate in interviews for up to one hour on the phone to discuss recognising and managing residents who are less well than usual. They also want to know how the Covid-19 pandemic has influenced or changed the way that these episodes are managed. Participants will receive reimbursement for their time. Involvement can be counted as Continuous Professional Development (CPD) and participants will get a certificate to confirm participation.
