Understanding Intention to Leave Among Care Home Staff

Researchers from ENRICH Scotland and Edinburgh Napier University want to interview care home staff working in Edinburgh City who are thinking about leaving their current job to understand what motivates a person with an intention to leave to either stay or leave. They also want to interview care home managers working in Edinburgh City to discuss staff retention and turnover. Participation in a one-off interview will be kept completely confidential. 

Study Updates
