Research Roundup

<u>Exploring the barriers, facilitators and integration pipelines of Multiplex testing in community settings.</u>

IVD Cooperative are conducting a study to understand the role, if any, of multiplex testing in care homes. These tests can diagnose 2 or 3 different viral infections using a single sample to support the management of respiratory virus outbreaks. They are conducting a survey to capture opportunities and limitations of such tests from the direct voices of key healthcare professionals working in care homes.

We estimate the survey to last 10 minutes; there is no correct answer, we would like participants to answer the questions based on their experience with respiratory virus tests and outbreak management. This will help researchers understand the ideal design and operating procedures for these tests to be helpful in real-life situations.

A Qualitative Exploration of Staff Experiences of Working and Responding to Distress Within Older Peoples Care Homes Throughout the COVID-19 Pandemic.

This research study is being run by Sophie Main, Trainee Clinical Psychologist at the University of Edinburgh as part of her Doctoral Thesis. The study aims to hear and explore care and nursing staff experiences of working in older peoples care homes during the COVID-19 pandemic, with a particular focus on experiences of responding to both personal and other people's distress during this time. Participation in the study involves completing a short demographic questionnaire and an interview with Sophie Main over MS Teams or telephone.

<u>Co-designing Psychological First Ald training for workers in Care</u> Homes - CoPACH

A group of researchers from Northumbria University/ University of Highlands and Islands/Bristol University are trying to make useful changes to an existing staff wellbeing training to better meet the needs of healthcare workers in care and nursing homes. We are hoping to do these changes in collaboration with healthcare workers (carers, nurses and managers) currently working in non

There are two ways that healthcare workers can get involved:

1. By being stakeholders and meeting online (up to 1.5 hr per meeting) with other stakeholders once a month starting in February 2023 and until end of July 2023 to discuss various developments of the collaboration.

2. Or by being participants, which will be a one off chat with the researchers (online, telephone or face to face) and the chat will involve reading a script from the current training and giving their expert thoughts about what needs to change in the script if anything; or have a chat about how the acceptability, accessibility and usefulness can improve for this training.

All participants will receive £25 voucher as a thank you (per hour of their time).

What do we plan to do? We will hold small online group meetings with carers. Then we will interview volunteers by zoom or phone. Together we will decide on important content for the new resources. Participants will receive a £25 gift voucher for taking part.



'Running on empty:' Care Home Workers' Experiences During the COVID-19 Pandemic

A team of researchers worked with Balhousie Care Group and colleagues from Northumbria University to explore the stress and coping experiences of health care workers in care home settings in Scotland during the COVID-19 pandemic. A cross-sectional mixed methods study was conducted using an online survey and interviews. Survey scores of 52 participants indicated high stress and medium coping skills. Participants with no health issues were associated with higher levels of coping. Thirteen HCWs participated in one-to-one interviews. A brief overview of the study is available via a video and full details of the study are available in their publication. The study highlights the personal sacrifices

impaired cognition. Additionally, the study acknowledges the strong sense of family within this HCW community and how this aided their ability to cope.

An evidence-based good practice, reflective guide for care home managers and senior care home staff to support ancillary staff has been developed by a team of researchers at Kings College London. <u>You can access it here.</u>
