

RICH Voices



What is RICH Voices?

Research In Care Homes (RICH) Voices is the 'patient and public involvement' group for ENRICH Scotland. We focus on the inclusion of people living or working in care homes in research-related activities.

What are research-related activities?

Activities could include, reviewing research requests that come into us to see whether they are appropriate and accessible for care homes to participate in; taking part in training and education related to research e.g. learn about the different types of research and how to participate; awareness-focused activities such as podcasts, films, presentations etc. that aim to challenging peoples understanding of care homes and stigma.

How can I get involved?

We currently have two main ways to get involved:

- 1. Join our RICH Voices core team
- We hold meetings either once a fortnight or once a month (depending on what activities have come through to us)
 - Meetings are online via MS Teams
 - Meetings are up to 1 hour long
- The aim of this meeting is to discuss activities that have come through to RICH Voices and see whether we feel they are appropriate to share with the wider RICH Voice community to participate in. We then share these activities with people who have signed up to RICH Voices but are not part of the core team.
- 2. Join our RICH Voices community

- You would link in with your local ENRICH Scotland Clinical Studies Officer.
- The Clinical Studies Officers will be provided with activities that the core team have reviewed and agreed should be shared
- If you would like to take part in any of these activities you can then let either the Clinical Studies Officer or our central team know.
- 3. Join our mailing list only.
- The mailing list only option would mean that you are not necessarily invited to individual opportunities that come up but you will be kept up to date with the work of RICH Voices through the newsletter.

Please note, if you live or work in a care home that is not currently signed up to ENRICH Scotland you can still join RICH Voices.
